Additional notes: Atlas Celeste is so rare that bound sets can be considered to be uniquely identifiable.

- APS copy bought at the Sotheby & Wilkinson sale, London, 21 Jan 1856 for 8 Guineas. Formerly owned by Sir George Shuckburgh-Evelyn (1751-1804). Binding damaged h.f. leather. Frontispiece soiled. (APS catalogue description, Ref. 2575, e-mail comm. to KJK from Roy E. Goodman, December 2011)
- Dis-bound set [last examined by KJK April 2018]. Plates XXXVII and XXXVIII missing. Likely one of the three nearly completed *Uranographia* atlases sold at auction in 1785. A separate two-page, hand drafted title 'Atlas Celeste' is probably the original for the 'advert' in some *Atlas Celestes*. Some clean plates, most very dirty and ragged. Catalogue and Tables heavily printed with deep embossment through paper. Hand drafted title pages (2) may be original draft from which 1786 printed title sheet was copied. Additional notes probably by Woolgar.
- In v. good condition. Re-bound 1998 (oil, red). MAS President 2019, Graham Hodson notes that the minutes of the NW Branch BAA General Meeting 8 May 1894, record that "Mr Shaw (James Begg Shaw) showed a fine old Celestial Atlas". Also referred to in MAS Minute book in 1930s
- Beautifully bound, red leather spine and corners. However, plates are folded. Honi Soit Qui Mal y Pense Knight of the Garter on the cover.
- Reasonable condition. Cover (solid green), embossed gold 'Atlas Celeste Bevis 1744'. Title page faded. See 11 below.
- In v. good condition. Binding and cover probably c1818 (oil, green). This atlas contains a title page commissioned by Woolgar in 1818.

- Has sometimes been mistakenly identified as an 1818 'edition'. Index appears before the plates. Otherwise very similar to MAS copy.
Several plain sheets of unwatermarked paper bound into atlas at end. One sheet has two drawings. A section of Milky Way; and a star field, showing the path of an asteroid c1815.
7. Includes a hand written transcription of a 1786 title page copied from that in an atlas owned by Prof. R.A.Gregory.
This and additional notes penned by W.H. Wesley, Assistant Secretary to the R.A.S. and dated 31 Oct 1906, See below. RAS atlas was examined by Kilburn in Feb 2008. Re-boxed in 2006. Red-brown covers, red oil-swirl endpapers. Frontispiece and some plates rather grubby.
 8. Good. Beige cloth boards, embossed gold 'Uranographia Britannica John Bevis 1745'. Oxford atlas includes several loose pages of notes by W.H. Wesley, dated December 20 and 27, 1907. Includes notes about the Bevis atlas taken from the 'Observatory' p361, 1886.
 9. In good condition. No other details available.
 10. In good condition. No other details available.
 11. Reasonable condition. Cover (solid green) embossed gold 'Uranographia Britannica Bevis 1744'. Front cover detached and loose.
 12. In poor condition. Plates very dirty, torn edges.
 13. Purchased for \$7250 from Douwma Ltd
 14. Bound in red library binding with the title ATLAS CELESTE embossed on the cover. Individual star charts interleaved with plain paper.
 15. Good condition. Cover 20th C., black cloth. Bought from Henry Sotheran, London (for eight guineas) in 1929. Niis Hansson to Ashworth, Feb 1980.
 16. No other information is available.
 17. Plates XXVIII and LI missing. Bound to 35 x 43cm.
 18. All plates in this very incomplete set, including the frontispiece, are hand coloured. The set contains two copies of Plate III, Draco.
Plates I, V, VI, XI, XXI, XXIV, XXV, XXXVII-XXXIX,XLII,XLVI and XLVII missing.
 19. Many of these proof copies are star charts without dedications.
 20. Plate LI missing. This atlas was described by W.H.Wesley, Assistant Secretary, Royal Astronomical Society, in October 1906.
His notes accompany the RAS atlas. Present whereabouts of this atlas is unknown.
 21. Possibly the same one sold at Sotheby's in October 1991 for c£14,000 to a buyer in San Francisco. Present whereabouts unknown.
 22. Offered by Bloomsbury Book Auction (London) for £7.5k, bought for c£14k by R Watson 2001. Sold October 2001 for c£26000.
Presently owned by Prof. J.M. Pasachoff, Massachusetts.
 24. This atlas is in a private collection and has not been available for examination.
 25. Individual Uranographia plates are occasionally offered for sale. According to Ashworth,(per comm Aug 2002) at least two atlases have been broken up, possibly from the Map House, London, 1976. In 1981, J.A.L. Franks Ltd, London, offered for sale individual plates depicting Aries, Corona Borealis, Ara, Delphinus, Auriga, Perseus, Sagitta, Virgo, Canis Major, Libra, Ursa Minor, Andromeda, Orion, Equuleus, Cassiopeia and Lyra at between £60-£70 each. There are currently (2002) at least ten other plates in private collections but the provenance of these is largely unknown.
 26. Brought to our attention by Bruce Stephenson, July 2003. Cataloged at Adler Planetarium c1994. Condition average. No further details.
 27. Communicated by Perry Vlahos, president, Astronomical Society of Victoria. September 2003. Dark blue hard covers protected with self-adhesive plastic, otherwise in excellent condition. All original plates are marked by water staining at top LH corner.
The frontispiece and index have been replaced with photocopies, thought to be from the RAS atlas. The designation 231, μ ζ MG, has been hand written on the back of the last plate. The number 231 also appears on a diamond-shaped label in the back of the atlas.
Two blank pages are bound in before, and two after, the star plates.
 28. Offered at \$2800 the pair, January 2002
 29. The GAC prints are currently (2010) framed and on display in the British Embassy in Paris. They were all purchased in early 1978 from Baynton-Williams (Map and Print dealer, formerly in London, now in Arundel). Given this date, it could be they are from one or other of the atlases broken up by the Map House in 1976. See note 25. The line on one of the invoices from the dealer (they were bought in 2 batches, first four and then another two) reads "After Bevis. 2 Celestial Charts. c.1786". GAC paid £25 each! Per comm. Roger Golding, 19 May 2006. Government Art Collection, UK
 30. Purchased by William Gibson (d.1969). Owned by the Heller family of the late Mrs Jean Heller, nee Gibson, Oxfordshire, until March 2008.
Sold at Bloomsbury Auctions 27 March 2008 for £21,000. Anonymous buyer.
19th C half blue calf over marbled boards, rubbed, edges worn, spine gilt letters. Distinctive stain in lower margin of the frontispiece.
A few oil spots to lower margins, only, of title, frontispiece, plate III and plate IV, a printer's crease to plate XI and plate LI. Dust staining to plate XLII
A repaired tear to the index leaf, otherwise a clean copy. *****
 31. Old World Auctions. Sedona Arizona. E-mail from J Pasachoff 5 Feb 2008
 32. Per. Comm. Plates \$90 each bought c 1950s from an interior decorator in Cleveland, Ohio by Mr Cathcart's grandmother. For sale at Bonham and Butterfield's
 33. E-mail from Prof. Nick Kanas, February 2008.
 34. Offered for sale Christies NY June 2008 from The Richard Green Library. [Previously sold Christies London, 24 October 1990, Lot 9, for £14,000]
Hand-coloured plates. Some slight marginal soiling to some. Coloured prints 'remarkably fresh, with colors bright'. Contemporary red half morocco (rebacked).
Contains hand-drafted 'manuscript' index at end on watermarked 1809 paper. Some individual plates are annotated in the same hand..
NB: Dr Green is a physician and amateur astronomer. He began collecting rare books and atlases in the early 1970's
 35. Communicated by Prof Owen Gingerich via Prof Jay Pasachoff, 25 September 2011. USC description; Contemporary or near contemporary marbled boards, with black morocco spine, and gilt leather label on front board. Distinctive large stain on paste down endpaper. Repaired tear to title page.
 36. Cover mottled brown polished leather with gilt-embossed edging of vines and flowers. Spine, tooled darker leather with gilt embossing. Title 'Bevis's Uranographia'.
Inside plain leaf stamped 'H Cavendish' (Scientist and FRS 1731-1810). General condition excellent but some star plates show ink 'strike through' to reverse of the paper. Some tables opposite star plates show ink bleed from star plate to table. Catalogue is printed double-sided (14 sides) on 7 leaves identified as A,B,C,D,E,F and G. Viewed by prior appointment 11 Nov 2011. KJKilburn *****
 37. Bought off Ebay ca Euro 300, December 2011, from seller in France. Mr Stephens is a member of the Society for the History of Astronomy.
 38. Blue, yellow, pink and black oil-pattered, calf-backed boards. Housed in cloth box. Light marginal browning. Both the title page and index are unbound which makes this atlas unusual.
 39. An incomplete set of proof plates taken before the copper plates were finished. May be Lot 770, from the 1785 auction.
Cover plain, green-blue boards with black spine. Gold embossed label on black background on front cover, 'Fiamstead's (sic) Celestial Atlas'.
 40. From the Mendillo Collection of Antiquarian Astronomical Charts and Maps [Michael Mendillo, Professor of Astronomy, Boston University, USA].Two in colour from Andrew Potter Gallery in London, three B&W prints from a bookstore in San Francisco. All purchased in 1970s-1980s. (17)
 41. Oblong folio (19 1/4" x 14 7/8"), leather spine over marble boards. "Table of the Stars" in gilt on spine. 51 uncolored engraved celestial charts. No frontispiece, title or index page. Individual charts with printed arms of the dedicatees (either academic institution or nobleman) beneath each image.
Each annotated with pencil, possibly by Richard Alexander, the previous owner. Plates are generally in good condition with foxing and minor staining. First and last plates exhibit comparatively more foxing. First fly leaf and plate I detached from binding with tape residue.

Includes signature and embossed seal of the possible previous owner, Richard Alexander, Madison Square Post Office, New York City and the 'Philosopher's Library of New York', possibly his own private library.

Pasted book plate with engraved shield for Bateman and another with a globe. Faded pencil markings reads "John Bevis 1745 Mr. Wesley Secretary of the the Royal Astronomical Society" who knew of three, one in the R.A.S library, one which belonged to the late Professor Adams and this one.
42 Unknown buyer.

43 All four plates have a green band (added later for decorative purposes?) at the edge of the plates. The interiors of the stars on all four plates are covered with what appears to be gold leaf (giving them a beautiful, shimmering appearance) and then surrounded with similar colored paint.

44. Oblong folio [49.2 x 38.1 cm], (1) f. engraved frontispiece, LI engraved star charts, (1) f. letterpress index. Bound in modern calf and marbled boards, title and author gold stamped on spine *Uranographia Britannica (sic) London 1750 John Bevis*. Only very minor rubbing to spine and boards.

NB: This is the same atlas that according to Ashworth was in the possession of John Booth, Cambridge House Books, Westbury Wiltshire c 1981. It was bought by Robert Gordon, New York, from Dominic Winter Book Auction Ltd (Booth was their agent) June 1996 (Lo451. Ind £6000-9000)

Previous note 23 deleted 9 May 2019. This Atlas Celeste was subsequently purchased from Robert Gordon by Martylan Lan Rare Books & W.P. Watson Antequarian Books in January 2019.
